In Communion, what we eat, we become!

Last year, I was officiating a funeral here at Blessed Sacrament and afterwards was invited to the reception at the family's home. During the meal, a young man asked me at the table, "Father Barrett, what is the real benefit of being a Christian?" I turned around and said, "That is a great question...and I believe that coming to know the real presence of Christ in our lives is what it is all about, to have our lives transformed as sacred servants and as a result, to transform others in the same way, through the power of God's love and grace."

The answer that I provided spurred on other conversations throughout the dinner table with several sharing how they are

seeking something that can fill their void in their own lives, that can give them a fresh start, a new outlook and spiritual perspective. They expressed how so many were needing a message of hope, peace and ultimate joy, especially in these uncertain times. I turned around and said to this small group at the table, "It is through knowing the real presence of Jesus in our lives that we can have such a life and live it abundantly."

In this special Corpus Christi Edition of our *Bethlehem Newsletter*, our patronal feast of Blessed Sacrament is recognized. WE ARE TRULY BLESSED!! We come to appreciate the outward and visible sign of an inward and spiritual grace, instituted by Christ as a sure means of that grace in our lives. This is a great celebration of the life of our parish that we discover that through Holy Eucharist, the Word of God and through Community, we establish relationship, and all come to know the real presence of Jesus. This is the reason why we worship as Christians, this is the reason why we become Christians, to become what we ingest, to become all we were created to be.

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The Feast of Corpus Christi is not a day that we expect Jesus to return to us as a "big wafer" coming from heaven, as someone shared lately on Facebook, sarcastically. This special time of our Patronal Feast of The Episcopal Church of the Blessed Sacrament commemorates the immense gift of the Eucharist in our lives and in the Church and how our Lord gave such an opportunity to discover the real presence of Christ in our lives.

Think of how many are looking forward to The Holy Eucharist being made available again, by us being one of the many churches opening Sanctuary doors to in-person worship this month, after not receiving due to our pandemic reality. But the reality of our desire in our hearts to receive the real presence of Christ provides us all that we need through our faith and hope, when we are unable to receive. And when we are able to obtain the body and blood of Christ by safe means, let us never take it for granted

Through the real presence of Christ, the sacrament of the bread to be the body and blood of Christ is to nourish and strengthen us for our journey through life. According to Tradition in the church and through sacred texts of various church leaders: **What we eat**, **we become**. We see with human eyes the bread and wine (Theologically, receiving the bread is receiving *both* the body and blood of Christ). We see with eyes of faith and spiritual understanding, not merely just bread consumed, but the risen and living Christ being manifested within us, through the power of the Holy Spirit.

In closing, while we are all discerning the appropriate location and timing of the physical presence of our worship and to eventually receive again the Holy Eucharist, know that no matter where we are or what venue or platform is decided by you or the leaders of the church, you are still being fully nourished spiritually by the real presence of Christ. This is confirmed in our Book of Common Prayer that when one is unable to eat and drink the Bread and wine, there is the assurance through such desire in ones heart that all the benefits of communion are received spiritually, even though the Blessed Sacrament is not physically consumed (BCP page 457).

It is through such an intake within our mind, body and soul, that we desire to receive Holy Communion with fervent love and respect -- not merely as a matter of routine, but to be at ONE. The Eucharist is the *Sacrament* of our full union with God, through what Jesus did for us; the real presence of Christ forever within us, no matter the temporary absence of any physical substance taken orally. It is how we spiritually ingest it in our communion and receive it spiritually by faith that truly matters.

This is what Corpus Christi is all about.



The Govorchins moved from Torrance to Yorba Linda November 1985. We had attended St. Cross Episcopal Church in Hermosa Beach. Suzanne Jennifer Govorchin was an 18 year old person with developmental disabilities and lived during the week in a Lutheran group home in Mission Viejo. She worked in a sheltered workshop, Vocational Visions.

The first time Suzanne and Ruth attended Blessed Sacrament Church, Suzanne became upset from something. I had to take her out and home. I received three phone calls that evening asking for us to come back. I asked Rudy to come to church with Suzanne and I, so he could help to keep her calm. He attended with us when he was off duty from the Fire Station on Terminal Island.

All three of us were welcomed with open arms. Suzanne had no more problems in church and loved to go to learn about "Jesus". Because I was a Special Ed teacher in Fullerton School District; I was invited to become a Sunday School teacher. I brought Suzanne to class with me and gave her projects to do. Rudy would attend and make friends and assist in taking care of projects around the church.

Church service was wonderful and just what we needed in our lives. We have been so blessed with the following items-just to name a few, that we have and continue to receive from Blessed Sacrament.

Suzanne died January 10, 1993 in her group home. Change of medication caused multiple seizures that she didn't survive. She was a blessing to all of us. Her twin older sisters adored her. Her personality radiated to others the Love of God. She adored Jesus. {Can you just see her hugging Jesus?}.

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We made a large poster with Suzanne's school graduation photo and used the letters of her name to create a display of her life.

Our first-born twin daughter, Brenda Lee, survived an abusive husband and came home to live with us. She also loved Blessed Sacrament Church and had taken over the care of the church library. She had existing physical problems. She was a "decorator" and wore many different hats.

On November 5, 2018 she was coughing badly. I stepped away from her to get cough syrup; by the time I was back-she was unresponsive, eyes rolling back in her head. We called 911. She was taken to St. Jude where many doctors and staff worked on her for hours. Brenda Lee had suffered a brain bleed which spread through her brain. They sent her to Critical Care Unit where she remained on life support until the morning of November 10th when life support was taken off. She died about 10 A.M.

What a BLESSING we had with Fr. Michael Neils from Torrance, our interim priest for Blessed Sacrament. He came to the hospital and also our home to assist in dealing with all the problems we faced. He presided over a wonderful, uplifting Requiem Mass. He will remain in our hearts forever as a wonderful care giver.

Our grief for both daughters has been difficult and long lasting. Grief isn't like a cold. You never get over it-you live through it, one day at a time. Our Faith in God and Jesus Christ has helped us to deal with it. We go out to Loma Vista Cemetery during holiday times and decorate the graves of our two Blessed Daughters.

What blessings we have had during these years with Blessed Sacrament and our deep, abiding Faith during these very dark times. We will always have our deep, permeating grief but attending church for these many years has assisted us in living with our deepest grief.

Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Praise the Lord for giving us the Church of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and the heavenly love and peace we find here.

Thanks Be To God! Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Just a few words about the grace bestowed upon Carol Ann and myself by our association with Blessed Sacrament. When we were looking for a Church in the area we considered 4 Episcopal churches. Blessed Sacrament was on our list because of the good people we knew from our previous church who had found a home here. Three things we looked for in making a decision were; 1) ministries to the community, 2) the congregation and it's commitment to serving God's People in need, 3) the Priest, the shepherd of the congregation.

We are truly blessed to have found in Blessed Sacrament; 1) a variety of wonderful ministries which are serving the surrounding communities, 2) the people of this congregation who contribute their time, their talents, and the sharing of those gifts God's Grace has brought them, in the name of Christ our Lord, ... and ... 3) Father Barrett, who is a true shepherd of his flock. His involvement and caring for all of us and what we try to do for others in Christ's Name truly is a reflection of our Lord! Father Barrett and all our brothers and sisters at Blessed Sacrament truly "Feed our Hungry Soul"!

Thank you all for accepting Carol Ann and myself into the flock, may God bless you all as we have been blessed by God's gift of you and Blessed Sacrament to us.

In the blessed sacrament of Holy Communion, Jesus comes to the worshiper in a "house of bread". Father David named the newsletter in November of 1978. It has been in circulation since that time.

A LITTLE HISTORY:


Many years ago, about two blocks from the church, stood a house on Palm Drive which was the home of Hilmer and Dorothy Lodge. *(Hilmer Lodge is seen in the photograph on the following page.)* On January 30, 1956, a meeting took place at that home, comprised of Episcopalians who wanted to start a church in Placentia. Parishioner, Mary Dalessi, was present at that meeting with her father, Hilton. The meeting produced a petition required by the Episcopal Diocese for that purpose. Bishop Frances Bloy granted the petition in June of that year, and the congregation was founded on October 7, 1956.

After being a private home it was a Montessori School and after that the house stood empty for many years and in January of 2006 parishioner, Jerry Hodson, visited the derelict property and took photographs which appeared in the March 2006 issue of the "Bethlehem". *(Some of which are shown below.)* Recently, the home was demolished and a new property nearing completion stands in it's place.

AN UPDATE FROM OUR TREASURER, JOANNE POWERS



Episcopal Church of the Blessed Sacrament Treasurer's Summary to Parish

May 18, 2020

Thank you all for doing what you can to help the parish continue operations while we are restricted from using our facilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The numbers below rounded to the nearest \$10 for clarity.

A. Income

No plate income was received in April since we held no in-person services. Envelope was also slightly lower than monthly budget, netting \$700 less than budgeted for the month. This month's overall income was \$3470 below budget, due to no rental income from the CLC and no usage of the parish hall or church for any meetings or performances. Annajeanne rental income was slightly above budget for the month but is still \$700 behind expectation for year-to-date (YTD). Overall YTD income we are \$2070 below target, or 4 percent under budget.

B. Expense

Monthly expenses were \$420 below budget, 2% below normal expected. Electric, gas, and phone costs are down modestly during our closure. Property taxes, insurance, and water bill came due in April, resulting in YTD expenses remaining \$670 above target for the first four months, about 0.5% over budget.

C. Overall Income vs. Expenses

Total monthly expenses exceeded income (\$4170). YTD overall expenses are \$4490 above YTD income at the end of this month.

D. Balance Sheet

The parish received a large designated gift during April which can only be used for repairs to the Annajeanne property (former rectory). In addition, the savings instruments recovered substantially due to the bounce back of the stock market in April. Official Vanguard statement values were not included in the bookkeeper's balance sheet, but unofficial verification of account balances in mid-May showed a recovery of more than \$21,900.

LAUNDRY LOVE At the time of printing it is unknown if we will have Laundry Love on Thursday, June 18. Coordinator, Doug Lee, will keep us informed via the weekly E-Tidings.

FEEDING GOD'S PEOPLE Placentia Presbyterian Church continues suspending Soup Kitchen (aka Feeding God's People at Blessed Sacrament) until further notice because of the Covid Crisis. Thursday, July 9, 2020 will be the next date we are scheduled to host, and our coordinator, Jane Peterson will keep us up to date with information.



OUTREACH PROJECTS-"BLESSING BAGS" AND "JUST FOR GIRLS"

The collecting of donations for these two projects will continue when we resume worship together in our church.



Sometimes we use this prayer, recommended by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry:


