Harmony with both Traditional and Progressive Living for Christ



Now that fall is here and we return to school, another football season, Halloween and fall kick-offs; we also go back to our spiritual traditions in the Church, namely Animal Blessings, All Saint's Day, Thanksgiving, Advent, and the anniversary of our parish. Immediately, we return to recognize all around us of the traditions that we have cherished for many years in our personal lives, our families, our communities, and society. We also acknowledge the <u>new</u> traditions upon us and the changes in our lives, like the tree leaves in the Autumn season--shifting various

colors in different ways each year. Change is constant in God's creation.

When we analyze the synonyms for the words of "traditional" and "progressive", we discover that the Episcopal Church and the Anglican Communion have ultimately married the two words as one: providing worship that is long-established, stable, historical, handed down and observant to our Tradition, Scripture, and Reason. Yet with such sacred Ordo and customs that are adaptable, the life of the body of Christ also becomes full growing, non-stagnant, developing, and neoteric, adhering to continuous revelation and ultimate transformation through the power of the Holy Spirit. In the over two thousand years of the history of Christianity, while far from perfect, the church has constantly changed to meet the needs of the people and to also proclaim Christ in reaching out for social justice. Both Clergy and Laity

advocating new ideas and groundbreaking inspiration that feeds the hearts of all God's people throughout the centuries have provided both numerical and spiritual growth. For us to hinder such expression negates the power of the Holy Spirit, even if some may find such variation a bit uncomfortable at first, due to their own personal piety or religious background. The Episcopal Church of the Blessed Sacrament is truly continuing such sacred growth and development by experiencing new members, new sacred music, new leadership, new inspiration and concepts to meet the needs of all of God's people. It is through a spiritual bond of both our traditions and progression that we can together encounter the power of the Holy Spirit in BOTH established and alternative ways that unite us and not divide us. All that is required by all parties is to understand that a "traditional" parish does not mean that we are <u>not</u> open-minded, receptive, flexible, inclusive, advancing, and creative through the Holy Spirit within that guides and nourishes all of us.

This understanding of "BOTH AND" and "Via Media" truly makes us a part of the Anglican Communion through our historical changes throughout the centuries, our Prayer Book, the Creeds, our budding traditional worship, the design of our sanctuary and so much more. We can also celebrate the ever evolving of our prayers, our embrace of the language of both Rite One & Rite Two, the eclectic array of worship music and instrumentation, new insights within our Christian Education, and so much more.

Some Proposed Projects

Marion Hetherington cultivated many wonderful outreach opportunities in her years as chair. We have some additional opportunities to share and are excited to get feedback from our existing members as well as new members.

Upcoming projects we hope to participate in are Operation Christmas Guild, Gift filled shoeboxes for children in 100 countries and a food distribution (from a scripted list) in the Garnet Neighborhood just east of the Target Shopping Center. Since the closing of the Soup Kitchen this outreach ministry, organized by Placentia Presbyterian Church (PPC), keeps PPC busy. The non-profit SOLIDARITY located in the neighborhood knows the families in need and distributes the food collected.

As always, there are on-going items we collect such as cancelled stamps, Campbell Soup Labels, items for Blessing Bags, A Can a week of food for our Deacon's Closet located south of the Altar, Soles for Souls (gently used shoe collection) and Greeting Card fronts (excluding Hallmark, American Greetings and any non-profit agency sponsored cards). Let's not forget the need for volunteers for Laundry Love, the third Thursday of each month at Busy Bee Laundromat. Contact Doug Lee for more information. (See below.)

Laundry Love

On 9/15/2022, Blessed Sacrament Laundry Love did 315 loads for 37 clients, spending \$478 (8.51 loads/person, \$12.92/person, and \$1.52/load). Hand sanitizers from American Legion Placentia Auxiliary were given out, along with face masks. Free detergent from EarthBreeze.com was used. Blessed Sacrament volunteers Tom Johnson, Marion Lee, and Doug Lee assisted Maria, the Busy Bee Laundry attendant. *CLC* contributed \$20. Someone at Busy Bee contributed \$6 anonymously. Thanks very much to all our supporters.

Fellow Parishioners, Vestry members, Clergy, and Administrative Staff I am here to say, along with my fellow authors, <u>"it takes a village"</u> to arrive at this moment in time.

The process of arriving here with actual construction and site preparation underway is due to countless hours provided by your current and previous Vestry as well as the help, guidance, and overall support of our diocese.

The fencing with screens on campus suggests we are limited in our view; however, Tom Johnson is always glad to review drawings with you and provide details as to the project and construction.

Kathy Dagestino is managing the ongoing decision making and adjustments to plans between the parish and CORE with help from Episcopal Community Services. If your curiosity needs satisfying as to progress, please don't hesitate to call your favorite vestry member or one of us.

The significant work of sorting and packing materials from the parish hall is finally completed after four months of many volunteers helping on Saturday mornings. We have a portable storage shed that is holding items we can manage without for 14 months, plus have located seasonal things we'll need near the doors. The temporary building has been placed and utilities connected. The Big Move is happening some time in mid-to-late October and beginning shortly thereafter, our old parish hall will begin to be demolished.

Our temporary parish hall will be smaller than our current one, but should accommodate the number of people that we recently have been seeing for our social gatherings. Our new parish hall will be ADA compliant and have many features that will be convenient for parishioners and CLC personnel. It will also be energy efficient and be much more sanitary.

We are still navigating with CORE and ECS a punch list of items which require resolution, but these decisions will not cause any delays in construction. The early work of grading the north and east parking lots and trenching and laying underground utilities is almost completed. The curbs for these two lots have been poured and the lots should be done soon. Next we will switch to using the new parking lots so that our current lot can be fenced in, graded and a large trench installed for remaining utilities. Over the next couple of weeks we will notice significant progress taking place with this exciting ministry.

All Hallows' Eve

The evening of Oct. 31, which precedes the church's celebration of All Saints' Day on Nov. 1. The popular name for this festival is Halloween. It was the eve of Samhain, a pagan Celtic celebration of the beginning of winter and the first day of the new year. This time of the ingathering of the harvest and the approach of winter apparently provided a reminder of human mortality. It was a time when the souls of the dead were said to return to their homes. Bonfires were set on hilltops to frighten away evil spirits. Samhain was a popular festival at the time when the British Isles were converted to Christianity. The church "adopted" this time of celebration for Christian use by observing All Saints' Day on Nov. 1, and All Hallows' Eve on the evening of Oct. 31. This evening before All Saint's Day was to prepare our hearts as Christians for the following day, knowing the Christian Celtic understanding of a thin space between heaven and earth. All Saints' Day

Commemorates all saints, known and unknown, on Nov. 1. All Saints' Day is one of the seven principal feasts of the church year, and one of the four days recommended for the administration of baptism. All Saints' Day may also be celebrated on the Sunday following Nov. 1. This is the day that we recognize and celebrate all believers in Christ who have died. We remember the Communion of Saints that watch over the Church and who have lived with us on this earthly pilgrimage or in the past; who are now in the closest presence with our Lord. Our parish will participate in such a Mass on Sunday, November 6th at both our 8:00 AM & 10:30 AM services. Please review the E-Tidings for more information.
