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# WHAT IS RESURRECTION REALLY ALL ABOUT FOR US?



Eastertide marks the holiest time for Christians throughout the world. It is a festive shout of Good News that in Christ, God has overcome the powers of sin, disease, and death, freeing us to live with assurance of eternal life and abundant life in the here and now. Resurrection is all around us, yet in other circumstances at times, our eyes could have blinders on because of fear, doubt, or uncertainty. We are not always looking within the spiritual lens to realize what is right in front of us constantly if we just recognize it.

From our Gospel lessons on this glorious Eastertide, we meet the disciples with certain mixed thoughts and emotions for the first Christians that included confidence yet confusion, exhilaration yet fear, well-being yet insecurity, darkness yet light. We are

engulfed in the most sacred instant that changes all of us and yet some may wonder where is the change for the better now?

As our Diocesan Bishop John Taylor stated recently—that prior to this most incredible moment of resurrection, "Jesus' execution plunged first his friends into profound despair. But Mary Magdalene's good news from the empty tomb ignited a movement that transformed the world. In the first century, followers of The Way faced entrenched enemies and overwhelming odds. Yet, for the first Christians, they experienced Jesus Christ's rising from the dead, and received power to overcome every challenge."

Today, we all know about challenges, don't we? We do not need to look too far for enormous circumstances that are in our lives; we look in our own backyard and see our own family members and many people sitting in our pews that have mixed emotions through continued pain and suffering and yet desire through faith the resurrective power of Christ to heal and transform.

As your Rector for the last four years, I know firsthand of the many issues of life that plaque our community of believers and I pray daily for our siblings in Christ to also receive such transformation. I also know the many testimonies that claim it. It is because of Christ's death and resurrection that we are all today God's resurrected people that continually are being transformed, that are being healed in mind,

body, and soul; that we are a resurrected people that are being redeemed to serve and know that God's love is real, alive, and well.

A type of metamorphosis happens continuously by faith, by the light within the empty tomb, by the evidence and witness of our Lord rising from the dead and altering the lives of those who believe. We proclaim the promise in our Baptism and receive the courage to empty ourselves out by trying to make our world better with the Holy Spirit within, so that God's covenant with us is made known. Yes, there are times that things can get worse before they get better, yet the Good News is that our Eastertide focus helps us face any discouragement and share the hope with others by word and demonstrations of our faith in Christ being alive in us.

Our resurrective ministries within Blessed Sacrament is witnessed daily that includes prayers and actions for justice, reconciliation and healing and do all we can to encourage the other because we know what the risen Christ has done for us. There are also many in our parish that have had recent miraculous examples of such powerful faith in our Lords' resurrection that brings about the manifestation of continual healing and restoration. The answer to prayer is continuous in God's perfect will, we need to just have a paradigm shift through the Spirit; our God truly reigns, if we just recognize and believe it.

During this Eastertide, let us be instruments of Christ and as resurrected people, truly know the restoration of our interconnection with God. Jesus the Christ enabled us to follow His example of "living by giving" through a resilient, compassionate, and resurrected Spirit and to share it with others. May we as an Easter people take our faith to new heights that requires us to take risks to pray for the other, to seek justice, mercy, equity, and peace for others, and to be a revitalized pastoral presence of Christ for the Other. For Christ's Resurrection is OUR Resurrection!! AMEN.

#### Blessed Sacrament Commemorates the Holiest of Holy Weeks

## Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday recalls an event in the New Testament of Jesus entering into Jerusalem on a donkey where He is warmly greeted by people waving palm branches. For Christians, it is a reminder of the welcoming of Jesus into our hearts and of our willingness to follow him. On Palm Sunday, Blessed Sacrament parishioners received Palm Crosses and palm fronds as they walked down the side walk to





the Sanctuary. Parishioners, who were led by the Govorchins, had made the Palm Crosses during the previous weekend. Black stones, to be brought back on Good Friday, were also given out. Parishioners could carry the stones throughout the Holy Week as a reminder of the sacredness of the week. Fr. Barrett blessed the palms fronds and crosses, and the stones before going into the church A very holy and sanctified service followed, including the reading of the Passion with beautiful choral music throughout.



## Maundy Thursday

The service this year took place in the Sanctuary at 7 p.m. During the service, participants could either choose to have their feet washed or their hands washed and anointed, as two stations were set-up. Father Barrett and Dcn Dominique had their feet washed and anointed by 2 Choir members as their offering.

Communion was given afterwards and at the end of the service, the Altar was stripped and washed down by Father, with the participation of the congregants. The lights were dimmed (until there was almost complete darkness) signifying that we were now prepared for Good Friday. There was no Mediterranean dinner this year, because it was felt that the temporary Parish Hall



was too small to accommodate the dinner. Hopefully the dinner will return next year in our new Parish Hall.

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## Good Friday

Good Friday is the saddest day of the Church Year. On Good Friday, our dear Lord gave his life for us so that we may have eternal life. On Good Friday, the Blessed Sacrament liturgy was at noon. This most somber service of the Church year commemorates the hanging of Jesus on the cross until his death.



A supplemental altar was set up for communion. There was no singing but there were chanting and readings. Black vestments were worn. The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John 18:1-42 was read with Fr. Barrett as Jesus and other parishioners read the various parts. Fr Barrett then gave a moving sermon about the suffering of Jesus.

There was veneration of the Cross by the congregation and the laying of a stone in the box at the base of the Cross.





Last two to venerate the Cross before Confession and Communion using Reserved Sacrament. After the final Communion Prayer, we depart again in silence.

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
# Stations of the Cross

In addition, there was an opportunity for attendees to receive reserve sacrament that had been consecrated at the Lord's Table on Maundy Thursday.
