Discernment—A Most Important Christian Spiritual Practice



"Discernment, the Christian practice of seeking God's call in the midst of the decisions that mark one's life, may very well be the single most important Christian spiritual practice for dealing with our contemporary dilemma." --

In this fall Kickoff and Home Gathering edition of our Church newsletter, we start off with the theme for this new quarter upon us: **Discernment**. There are a lot of issues going on in our everyday lives as Christians today. We as parishioners of Blessed Sacrament

are given an extra dose of transition and decision-making that is happening right now in our government and society, in our local community, in our personal lives, and in the life of our parish.

The extra dose of transition in our parish is all of us embarking on the new ministry on our campus: Santa Angelina Senior Housing Community. Our Vestry has just concluded a weekend retreat called Discernment: Seeking God in Confusing Times. Our time together included the requirement and importance of discernment and the prerequisite to see what God has in store for us as we move forward in this vital ministry for our community. We also discussed through our discernment process about our Mission Statement in our parish and how to better define it as we move forward.

Spiritual discernment refers to the ability to perceive and understand spiritual truths and insights, and to receive guidance from them. It involves a deep understanding of spiritual matters and our relationship to God. We as Episcopalians often refer to the "three-legged stool" for such insight for living, as we look to Scripture, Tradition and Reason for discernment in the life of the Church and in our personal wellbeing. We as Christians who practice spiritual discernment seek to understand the will of our Lord and divine wisdom through underlying spiritual sources and realities that influence our lives and decisions.

According to Elizabeth Liebert, a discerning member in Christ is "a person who seeks, in all that he or she does, that which better responds to God's call in the moment. A discerning person begins to desire what God desires more than any other created reality." During the next three months, we will be involved in such participation through our Worship, Sacred Book Study, fall and winter one-day retreats for both our Angelinos and our Angelinas, our Daily Devotion, Bible Study topics and more.

The way of Discernment is the way for decision making and renewal. As members of the Body of Christ, let us together spiritually "sort out" and "sift through" what the Spirit of the living God is calling us to do in all of our 18 ministries in our parish. In discerning together, let us work together through God's amazing Grace and fully participate in the involvement of our full humanity and our full communion with God.

Nothing beats a hug or a "I love you" from a child to brighten my day. Knowing that we are a safe place and knowing that each child knows that they are loved is what matters the most to me.

The last couple years one of the best things is having my daughter work here at school (who also went to preschool here) and having my own grandson here with us.I am truly blessed to be doing something that I love, and the relationships I have made with my staff & the parishioners is what makes it easy to come to work.

2) How has the CLC changed in the last 25 years?

Tracie responded: Wow where do I start! When we first started here 25 years ago, we had a total of 4 classrooms. We had 3 classrooms set up in the parish hall with dividers and we used the nursery. We would have to pack the classrooms up every weekend and every Monday put it all back together. With hard work & prayer we were finally able to get our classrooms built on the property (not without a fight from neighbors) some who even picketed outside our school. Now we have grown to 6 classes and are a well-known pre-school in Placentia. Our connection with Blessed Sacrament has also grown throughout the years. We are one with the church, & we are in this together to support and help each other when needed. I always say our school is like "The Little Blue Engine That Could" and if we just keep thinking "I think I can I think I can" we can make it through anything!

Dear Church Family,

As you may have heard, I am stepping down from my role as church music director. As my good friend Mr. Fred Rogers says, "You rarely have time for everything you want in this life, so you need to make choices. And hopefully your choices can come from a deep sense of who you are."

I have loved directing the music at Blessed Sacrament for the past few years, but now I believe my most important work is to be the best mom I can be to my daughter, and that means making the choice to work less and to prioritize rest and family time as these childhood years fly by. Though I am stepping back from the church music ministry, I have accepted an opportunity with CLC as their preschool music teacher, which means I will get to spend time each week singing with Ivy and her friends. I can't wait to get started next week, and I pray that my work at the CLC may become the seeds of a children's choir at Blessed Sacrament one day.

Being a church music director was a calling I longed to fulfill for many years, and I am ever grateful to Fr. Barrett and the musicians and good people of our parish, past and present, who helped me grow in my gifts as a singer and conductor.
